As Prime Minister, Fredrik Reinfeldt reformed the Swedish economy and labour market, making it one of the most competitive countries in Europe. The economy had higher growth rates and sounder public finances than other European countries and was the only country in the EU that lowered national debt during the financial crises.

Having also been a member of the European Council and the last President of the Council before the appointment of a full-time President, Fredrik transitioned into an advisory and lecturing role post-politics. He now imparts his extensive knowledge on economics, governance, and European and Nordic politics to audiences worldwide. Notably, he remains a staunch advocate for job creation and chairs the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative, a crucial organisation dedicated to fostering good governance in the oil, gas, and mining sectors.
